A letter from the Superintendent

Dear Caledonia Schools Community,

am excited to welcome everyone back to school for the start of the 2021-22 academic year. I hope this summer provided time for you and your family to recharge and get ready for all the excitement and activity that starting a new school year brings.

As the year starts and the pandemic still creates uncertainty about the future, I want to remind everyone that we have a lot to celebrate at CCS. Over the past three years we have adopted an aggressive strategic plan with broad community input and passed an operating millage renewal and \$88 million school bond. We've invested \$15 million in improvements this summer alone. All schools in our district received an "A" for proficiency based on standardized testing prior to the pandemic. We improved the graduation rate to 96.3 percent with over 16 percent of our graduating seniors this year taking one or more AP courses and receiving a 4.0 or higher and 81 percent of graduates planning to continue their education next year.



Based on past and current indicators, CCS has provided a high-quality education to thousands of students year after year, even during a pandemic. These accomplishments were obtained by dedicated parents and staff members having a unified focus on growing our students as scholars in a positive learning environment where we all engage each other with kindness, dignity and respect. The focus of providing a quality learning experience that fosters citizens of high character must remain our unified focus as a school community.

I look forward to working together and getting the school year off to a strong start.

to ensure every student at Caledonia High School feels welcome and encouraged to learn and grow.



Bond And School Improvements Update

n May 2020, the community passed the \$88 million bond for infrastructure and other improvements within the school district. This summer we have made huge strides in delivering almost \$15 million in improvements across our school district.

The remodeling of Duncan Lake
Middle School got a head start with
work that began over spring break. Our work will
finish in October. The building was safe and ready for
students when school began and work continues on
the entry, windows and the main office area. Students
were greeted with new classrooms, a new science
wing, improvements in the gym space and a new
media center.

The Kraft Meadows Middle School room additions are also complete and ready for students. The expansion of the cafeteria will be near completion and available for use after the first few weeks of school. The current cafeteria space has undergone significant changes and is ready for students to use.

The administration building at 8948 Kraft Ave. will be ready for staff use early this fall. This summer we were also able to replace substantial sections of parking lots at several locations.

Kettle Lake and Caledonia elementary schools now have working air conditioning in classrooms! We look forward to continuing classroom and building work at these buildings next summer.

What's coming next?

The community center has been fully designed and is almost ready for earthwork and concrete foundations.

The replacement for Dutton Elementary School is well underway at 76th Street and Patterson Avenue with design and we are looking forward to kicking off the project this spring.

New LINKS program offered at Duncan Lake Middle School

tudents at Duncan Lake Middle School can participate in a new elective this year! LINKS is a Peer to Peer course designed to promote independence and socialization for students with disabilities by providing peers who model typical academic and social behavior across school environments. The purpose of Peer to Peer is to provide opportunities for students with autism access to general education curriculum and peers.

The LINKS program has been a popular elective and an aspect of Caledonia High School culture for eight years. It was also offered as an 8th grade elective course at Kraft Meadows, then a middle school, for seven years. The LINKS, or peers, also benefit from



the course as they learn about students with disabilities and have real-life opportunities to practice skills in organization, responsibility, problem solving, decision making and leadership. We are excited to expand this program and offer this experience to all our middle school students.

New Honors Structure at CHS

eginning with the graduating class of 2022, Caledonia High School will adjust the way we celebrate academic success. CHS will no longer limit itself to celebrating the top 10 seniors, electing instead to expand the recognition of academic excellence. This change in practice is in alignment with what many other high schools are doing to recognize the academic achievements of students.

Rather than a numerical rank of students (Top 10, Valedictorian and Salutatorian), CHS will recognize academic success for the class of 2022 and beyond with the achievement categories listed below.

New CHS Honors Distinctions

- Cum Laude (meaning "with honor") will be awarded to candidates whose grade point average is 3.300-3.499.
- Magna Cum Laude (meaning "with great honor") will be awarded to candidates whose grade point average is 3.500-3.999.
- Summa Cum Laude (meaning "with highest honor") will be awarded to candidates whose grade point average is 4.000 or higher.

Over the past several years, colleges have minimized the value of class rank as a factor in determining college admission. Course selection, an upward trend in GPA, passionate engagement in school and community activities, and demonstrating leadership and initiative are the essential factors leading to admission.

The overall importance of test scores in student college acceptance rates has also decreased as

a result of many colleges moving toward a "testoptional" application process. However, CHS will still report a student's class rank if a college or university makes this request, and a student's class ranking can also be obtained for scholarship purposes.

This change is important for encouraging our students to make targeted choices in their educational planning, explore and develop new course pathways throughout middle and high school, and honor the academic achievements of as many graduating Fighting Scots as possible. In addition, given the wide variety of post-secondary pathways available to students, it is important to show the value and celebrate high levels of academic achievement in other areas beyond the traditional means of accelerating GPA elevation and attainment.

CHS is also creating a new process for selecting the student who will be awarded the distinguished opportunity to speak at the commencement ceremony. Seniors falling in the Magna Cum Laude and Summa Cum Laude designations following Spring Break will have the opportunity to apply for this honor. Each candidate will be provided with the opportunity to prepare a speech (based on the qualities listed above) and present their speech to a panel of faculty, administration and senior class officers (students).

CHS is excited about this new opportunity to celebrate all our students with high honors, redefine what honorable academic success looks like for our students, and celebrate as many Fighting Scots as possible.

With this app, we are putting important information directly in the hands of parents and students. The app is designed to provide answers to almost any question a parent has about our school system. It also has the potential to be a lifeline in the event of severe weather



or crisis during which traditional phone lines are not working.

Getting started with the new FREE app is easy. To begin, search in your phone's app store for "Caledonia Community Schools" and look for our logo. After downloading the app, users will have the option to choose the schools, information and alerts they would like to receive.

The new app will be available starting Sept. 10 for both Apple and Android users and works on any tablet or device with a web browser.

App instructions

- 1. Tap the menu button and sign in using your school account if you have one. If not, click "sign up" to start a new account.
- Tap "schools" on the menu, then tap the gear icon to select your school.
- 3. Tap the menu choice with the gear icon and your name and choose how you'd like to receive notifications.



Apply for Free and Reduced Lunch Programs

our child can receive a free breakfast and a free lunch at school.

We have exciting news: The USDA has announced it is extending the waiver for free meals to all students 18 years old and younger, and 26 years old and under if a student has special needs. This applies to all school meal programs and childcare institutions across the country, allowing us to continue serving healthy meals to all for the 2021-22 school year.

Please note: While the waiver has been extended, it is still important to apply for free/reduced lunch because those numbers are used to fund programs that help students.

Starting August 30, five (5) free breakfasts and five (5) free lunches will be available for pick up at Duncan Lake Middle School every Monday from 9 a.m. – 10 a.m. near the tennis courts. Look for the white tent!


Holidays/Exceptions:

Free & Reduced

This year breakfast and lunch have been free for ALL students because of the USDA grant! While this is a great opportunity for our families, we know this will not always be the case. It is important that our district be able to accurately report which families qualify for free/reduced lunch. Not only can it help families ease the burden of paying for school meals, but this data is also used in the following programs that help fund our schools.

- If the USDA grant runs out, filling out the application will ensure qualified children continue to receive breakfast and lunch for free.
- Building and district-level free and reduced lunch numbers are used by the federal government to



determine "at-risk" funding which ultimately impacts staffing at Caledonia Community Schools. Positions such as our counselors, reading interventionists, Title I paraprofessionals, family engagement coordinator and more are often completely or at least partially funded with these dollars.

 We submit our free and reduced lunch numbers to the federal government in June and this information is used to determine our federal funding for the next school year. Therefore, we still need families to fill out the application if they qualify, even though there has been free lunch all year.

If your family has already filled out an application and been approved this school year, you don't need to apply again. Thank you in advance for taking the time to complete this application.

The are pleased to announce that you will continue to see hazard light stops in addition to the traditional red light stops in our Caledonia community. Michigan law permits school bus stops to be made under certain prescribed conditions, which allow for either red light or hazard light stops as provided in MCL257.1855. There are many instances where a school bus can safely perform a hazard light stop and allow traffic to flow when students do not have to cross the roadway and all criteria are met according to Michigan law.

The Transportation Department is working together to provide the safest and most efficient transportation for

our students, with safety being our number one concern. Please keep our kids safe by approaching school buses with caution and observing the light systems.

In the event that you observe a reckless driver ignoring the flashing red lights, please assist our transportation department by contacting the Kent County Sheriff Department at (616) 632-6100, to report the location, approximate time, make, color or model of the vehicle. While our drivers are trained to report these violations, we encourage everyone to be vigilant regarding bus traffic safety and our students.


